Final preparations have been made for the Annual St. Regis
Park Easter Egg Hunt. It is scheduled for 10:00 AM on
Saturday, March 19, and Spring officially arrives the following
day on Sunday, March 20. Within the next few weeks, the
leaves will be popping out, the grass will begin growing, and
the City of St. Regis Park will become "green" once again. The
days may seem longer since Daylight Savings Time resumed
on March 13. Hopefully warmer temperatures and sunnier

April will be an exciting month both for the City of St. Regis Park and Greater Louisville. MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MONTHLY COUNCIL MEETING

March 1, 2016

Following are the Minutes of the regular monthly Council Meeting for the City of St. Regis Park, held at 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, March 1, 2016 at 4318 Taylorsville Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40220.

ROLL CALL:

Present: Council Members Bob Graves, Louie Schweickhardt, Eric Shackelford, Frank Wheatley, Cheryl Willett.

Absent: Mayor Brandt Davis and Council Member Talbott Allen.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Due to the absence of Mayor Davis, Mr. Wheatley made a motion to appoint Ms. Willett as Mayor Pro-Tem. The motion was seconded by Mr. Graves, and it passed without dissent.

Ms. Willett opened the floor to Mr. Mike Porter who resides on Lincoln Road. Mr. Porter is considering the placement of a visual screen along Weicher Creek adjacent to his home and needed details on how to proceed for a variance for the project. The Council asked that he submit a building permit, along with all specifications and location of the proposed visual screen for review. Mr. Singler also recommended that he contact the Metropolitan Sewer District (MSD) for review and approval.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Charlie Veeneman, City Accountant, presented the Financial Report for February 2016. General Fund revenues for the month were \$17,922.59 with year-to-date revenues at \$343,394.67. Total expenses for the month were \$15,320.01 with year-to-date expenses at \$204,921.36, resulting in year-to-date revenues over expenses of \$138,473.31.

Road Fund revenues for the month were \$2,299.09 with year-to-date revenues at \$19,713.00. Total expenses were \$9,275.00 with year-to-date expenses at \$9,275.00, resulting in year-to-date excess revenues of \$10,438.00.

Mr. Hoard made a motion to approve the February 2016 Financial Report. The motion was seconded by Mr. Shackelford, and it passed without dissent.

MINUTES:

Mr. Graves made a motion to approve the Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting held on February 2, 2016. The motion was seconded by Mr. Hoard, and it passed without dissent.

TREE BOARD:

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Ms. Jane Ecker and Mr. Joe Hinkle of the City Tree Board, along with City Arborist, Ms. Cindi Sullivan, attended the meeting and discussed the following:

 The City has achieved Tree City USA status and a member of the Kentucky Department of Forestry will be present at the Arbor Day celebration to recognize our City. • The Tree Board requested to do a pilot project for the maintenance (dead-wooding) of trees in the spring of 2016. Residents would submit an application, Ms. Sullivan would review and approve, residents would enter into a contract with the approved contractor and the City would reimburse the resident for the work.

Mr. Hoard made a motion to approve the pilot project. The motion failed to receive a second.

The Council requested that the Tree Board revise the pilot project and require homeowners to agree to share the cost instead of the City covering all costs. Mr. Singler requested the Tree Board work with him to establish a process that is used in other small cities prior to the April meeting.

- The 2016-2017 Tree Board budget was submitted and will be reviewed and approved during the annual budget process.
- A motion was made by Mr. Graves to move forward with the planting of trees in the backyards of residents' homes. Mr. Hoard seconded the motion, and it passed without dissent.

In February, Mr. Betts patrolled 111 miles, issued 7 Hi-Neighbor notices, received 2 complaints and conducted 13 house visits.

CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT: JOHN SINGLER

Mr. Singler requested that Ordinance 5, Series 2015-2016, which will allow the City to enter into a Franchise Agreement for communication services be tabled. Mr. Graves made a motion to table the ordinance. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wheatley, and it passed without dissent.

Mr. Singler introduced Ordinance 6, Series 2015-2016, an ordinance that amends the Tree Board and Relating to the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees within the City. Mr. Hoard made a motion to approve the 1st Reading of the ordinance. Mr. Shackelford seconded the motion, and it passed without dissent.

PUBLIC WORKS: LOUIE SCHWEICKHARDT

Mr. Schweickhardt will work with the City Engineer to inspect the damaged street gutters and cracks in the roadway pavement. Mr. Schweickhardt will also contact the contractor who previously painted house numbers on the curbs for repainting this spring.

SPECIAL EVENTS: TALBOTT ALLEN (Absent)

Ms. Willett reported the annual Easter Egg Hunt will be held on Saturday, March 19th, at the Bullitt Field at the end of Lincoln Road.

NEW BUSINESS:

The City Council has reviewed the salary of both elected and appointed officials of the City of St. Regis Park and compared it to the published pay rates of Kentucky Cities on file with the Kentucky League of Cities and determined that the pay of the City of St. Regis Park is substantially below the median pay in comparable cities.

Based on that information, the City Council desires to compensate its officials fairly and encourage interest in filling any open positions in City government through reasonable compensation, Mr. Graves made a motion to approve the 1st reading of Ordinance 7, Series 2015-2016, which states:

- The compensation of each Council Member is hereby fixed at the sum of \$250.00 per month, payable monthly, commencing with the beginning of the Council's new term, January 2017.
- The compensation of the Mayor is hereby fixed at the sum of \$800.00 per month, payable monthly, commencing with the beginning of the Mayor's new term, January 2019.
- The compensation of the appointed position of Clerk/ Treasurer is hereby fixed at the sum of \$750.00 per month, payable monthly, commencing with the effective date of this ordinance.
- The compensation of the appointed position of Citation Officer is hereby fixed at the sum of \$550.00 per month, payable monthly, commencing with the effective date of this ordinance.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Shackelford, and it passed without dissent.

ADJOURN:

There being no further business, Mr. Graves made a motion to adjourn. The motion was seconded by Mr. Schweickhardt, and it passed without dissent. The meeting adjourned at 8:14 p.m.

BRANCHING OUT

It is with great pride and gratitude that the St. Regis Park Tree Board announces the City of St. Regis Park has been selected as a 2016 Tree City USA!



Tree City USA is a national recognition program that began in 1976 and is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service and National Association of State Foresters. By meeting four fundamental standards, an incorporated municipality of any size can qualify. Here is how we accomplished our goal of being recognized for our efforts to maintain and restore our tree canopy:

First Standard: Establish a Tree Board. With great forward thinking, Mayor Brandt Davis and the St. Regis Park City Council approved the establishment of a 3-member Tree Board in 2014, appointing Jane Ecker, Joe Hinkle and Mary Mattingly to the inaugural board.

Second Standard: Enact a Tree Care Ordinance. Modeling the ordinance after others in the state, the Mayor and City Council passed a tree care ordinance, initiating the process of protecting our tree canopy.

Third Standard: Allocate \$2 per capita to a community forestry program. St. Regis Park, in hiring Cindi Sullivan as our City Arborist, surveying city trees, and planting 88 trees in a year-and-a-half, dedicated approximately \$25 per capita in 2015 to our efforts, which we call Re-Tree the Park.

Fourth Standard: Proclaim and Observe Arbor Day. Last year we celebrated Arbor Day by presenting the results of our front-yard tree

survey, playing games with the children, describing our efforts to citizens who attended, and raffling off a beautiful crepe myrtle. This year we are thrilled to announce that our Tree City award will be formally presented at the celebration on April 23rd, at 2 PM, in the Ascension cafeteria. We hope you will join us for the presentation, the awarding of an inaugural *Tree Hero Award* to a citizen/family supporting our efforts to maintain a healthy tree canopy, another ornamental tree raffle, the announcement of a year-long tree photo contest (Start photographing your tree in all four seasons!), activities for children, and refreshments.

Being named a Tree City is not the end—it is just the beginning of our efforts to maintain and add to our tree canopy. As I write this column, there is an article in *The Courier-Journal* ("City Struggles to Dig Out of Deep Tree Deficit", James Bruggers, 2-29-16) about the City of Louisville's efforts to add more trees to the canopy in the Metro area — we feel we are leading the way with our progressive efforts!

We are happy to announce that we are taking applications for trees in **back yards** as well as front and side!!!!! So please get in touch with us by the end of March to get on our list. PUBLIC SAFETY CORNER

SPRING CLEANUP FOR SAFETY



The grass will soon be growing, the plants budding and the flowers and trees blooming. Spring is arriving and your thoughts may be turning to the dreaded ritual of spring cleaning. With it comes a timely reminder to keep your home safe from the threat of fire. In an effort to make this "Spring Cleanup" a fire safe one, the following safety tips are provided:

- Clean your garage of stored newspapers, magazines or other rubbish that can fuel a fire.
- Test your smoke alarms monthly.
- To help prevent nuisance alarms, gently vacuum your smoke alarms every six months or as needed.
- Change batteries in smoke alarms, flashlights and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Never borrow smoke alarm batteries to use for toys or other equipment.
- Replace all smoke alarms every 10 years or as recommended by the manufacturer.
- Keep outdoor debris or dead vegetation away from the house,
- Properly dispose of oily or greasy rags. If these items must be stored, they should be kept in labeled, sealed, metal containers.

- If you store gasoline, keep it outside your home in a shed or detached garage. Keep only small quantities in tightly sealed containers. Use gasoline only as motor fuel – never as a cleaning agent.
- Use outdoor barbecue grills with caution. Place in a safe area away from buildings, windows, heating, ventilation and air conditioning units or places with high/dead vegetation.
- Never use gasoline to start the fire, and don't add charcoal lighter fluid once the fire has started.
- Use barbecue grills outside only not under overhangs or balconies, and away from combustibles.
- Check your propane barbecue grill hose for leaks and cracks; never store propane indoors.

INFORMATION TO IMPROVE HOMEOWNERSHIP PAY YOURSELF FIRST



The principle to pay yourself first has been referred to as the *Golden Rule of Personal Finance*. The concept is that one of the first checks you write each month is for your own savings. The rationale is that if there is no money left after a person pays their bills, there is

nothing to contribute to savings or investments that month.

By establishing a priority to save, a person realizes that the balance of their monthly income must cover living expenses and other discretionary spending. This is a much different strategy than saving what is left over from monthly expenses and other spending.

Many financial experts have likened an amortizing mortgage to a forced savings account because a portion of each payment is applied to the reduction of the principal amount owed. Some homeowners have taken that concept further with a shorter term mortgage to build equity faster.

A \$250,000 mortgage at 4% interest can be compared with two different terms. A 30 year mortgage would have payments of \$1,193.54 each month with the first payment having \$360.20

being applied to the principal. Each payment would have an increasingly larger amount applied to the principal.

A 15 year mortgage would have payments of \$1,849.22 each month with the first payment having \$1,015.89 being applied to the principal. The \$665.68 difference in payments goes toward reducing the loan amount and acts like a forced savings.

A homeowner might opt for the longer term and intend to put the difference in the two payments in a bank savings account each month or make an additional principal contribution to pay the mortgage down. However, as any person responsible for paying household bills knows, there will always be something that comes up that could hijack your intentions.

By committing to the shorter term mortgage, a borrower is continuing to make the higher payment each month and the benefit is that it will reduce tour principal balance faster.
