Dear Fellow Residents:

I want to begin by offering my deepest appreciation and gratitude to St. Regis Park residents **Jim and Mary Wallitsch**. Each year **Wallitsch Nursery**, 2608 Hikes Lane, donates a number of trees to Metro Parks. This year, because of their ties to our City and the efforts of the St. Regis Park Tree Board to meet the standards of the Tree City USA program, they have generously given the City more than a dozen trees to distribute to our residents. These trees will be given free of charge, including planting, to those interested by means of a lottery. **This is a one-time only offer of a free tree, and time is of the essence.** Complete details are outlined in the article **"St. Regis Park Tree Board Lottery."**

The City's contract with Rumpke Waste and Recycling Services expires June 30, 2015. St. Regis Park has already been successful in securing a proposal from Rumpke to continue the same level of services – trash, recycling, and yard waste removal – for an additional two years, through June 30, 2017 – with no increase in cost. The contract has been approved and is being finalized. In short, we have successfully negotiated this contract with no increase since July 2011.

**St. Regis Park's Annual Holiday Extravaganza** will be held on **Sunday, December 7**, at the **St. Andrew United Church of Christ**, 2608 Browns Lane, from **4:30–6:00 PM**. Pizza and snacks will be available. There will be music and lots of door prizes, and the children will have an opportunity to have their pictures taken with the one and only Santa Claus. Join your neighbors for an afternoon of fun and fellowship.

Also in keeping with the Holiday Season, the City of St. Regis Park will again hold a **"House Decoration Contest."** In fact the judging has been expanded, and this year, there will be three categories: **Best Traditional Home, Most Creative**, and for those of you truly into the Holiday Spirit, **the Clark Griswold Award**. The secret and impartial panel of judges will be looking for "tastefully" decorated homes in the first two categories, but the Clark Griswold Award is an all out, no holds barred contest. A **\$200 gift card** will be awarded to the winner in each category. **To participate, your home must be decorated by Monday, December 15.** We anticipate this year's contest will be the best ever.

Many of you may be aware several of our sister cities offer a leaf collection service in the fall and early winter. For several years your City Council has discussed the possibility of such a service, similar to those offered in Lyndon and St. Matthews. We need your input. This would require blowing and/or raking your leaves to the curb for collection. Although it is too late in the year to implement at this point, if there is sufficient interest, we are hopeful such a program could occur in the fall of 2015. We ask for your comments, whether they be for or against. Let us know what you think. Your responses will determine whether this additional service should be pursued.

# **CITY OF ST. REGIS PARK MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MONTHLY COUNCIL MEETING**

**Tuesday, November 4, 2014**

Following are the Minutes of the regular monthly Council Meeting for the City of St. Regis Park, held at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, November 4, 2014, at 4318 Taylorsville Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40220.

## **ROLL CALL:**

Present: Mayor Brandt Davis; Council Members Talbott Allen, Bob Graves, Stephen Hoad, Louie Schweickhardt, Eric Shackelford (arrived at 8:09 p.m.), Frank Wheatley, Cheryl Willett. Absent: None.

## **MAYOR'S REPORT:**

Mayor Davis introduced Ms. Jane Ecker who was representing the St. Regis Park Tree Board. Ms. Ecker presented a plan where resident Mrs. Mary Wallitsch of Wallitsch Nursery will donate 15-18 trees and the City will bear the cost of \$150 per tree to have them planted. The trees will be given to residents that enter their name in a lottery and agree to maintain them. The mechanics of the lottery, planting details and deadline dates will be determined and forwarded to the appropriate Council Members for distribution to residents by the monthly newsletter, the City website and Facebook.

The Council reviewed the current Tree Board budget and determined funding for the project is available. This project is a one-time occurrence and will not set a precedent for the future. Mr. Allen made a motion to approve \$2,700.00 for the planting of up to 18 trees. Mr. Schweickhardt seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

Mr. Jason Lewis of Foxy Poise Road attended the meeting as a representative of Ascension School on Lynnbrook Drive. Mr. Lewis requested feedback from the Council to have signage posted on City street sign posts that would direct people to the school. The general consensus of the Council did not favor the proposed signage but requested Mr. Lewis provide at the next Council Meeting detailed sign specifications and the locations where they would be placed.

Mayor Davis reached out to the City of Cambridge and the Brookhaven Neighborhood Association regarding a possible merger or annexation with the City of St. Regis Park. At this time, there is no interest by any of the parties to enter into any further discussions.

The City received a 2 year extension agreement from Rumpke Waste and Recycling Services to extend the current contract with no increase in cost. This new contract would become effective July 1, 2015 and run through June 30, 2017. Mr. Allen made a motion to accept the agreement extension. Ms. Willett seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

## **FINANCIAL REPORT:**

Mr. Charlie Veeneman, City Accountant, presented the Financial Report for October 2014. The General Fund revenues for the month were \$17,676.56 with year-to-date revenues at \$277,725.73. Total expenses for the month were \$18,603.44

with year-to-date expenses at \$4,756.00, resulting in year-to-date excess revenue over expenses of \$182,969.73

The Road Fund revenues for the month were \$3,292.27 with year-to-date revenues at \$12,179.46. Total expenses for the month were \$0 with year-to-date expenses at \$1,485.00, resulting in year-to-date excess revenue of \$10,694.46.

Mr. Graves made a motion to approve the October 2014 Financial Report. Ms. Willett seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent. Complete financials are posted on the City's website at [www.stregispark.net](http://www.stregispark.net)

## **MINUTES OF THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING:**

Mr. Schweickhardt made a motion to approve the Minutes of the regular Council Meeting held on October 7, 2014. Mr. Allen seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

## **POLICE REPORT:**

LMPD Officer Towning was present representing Kentuckiana Law Enforcement (KLE). The Small City Activity Report for October will be published in the monthly newsletter.

## **CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT: MEL MILBURN (absent)**

Although Mr. Milburn was not present, he had earlier submitted to the Council his recommendation to replace two sections of sidewalk at 4524 Dannywood Road. Mr. Schweickhardt will coordinate the project after conferring with the City's Consulting Arborist, Ms. Cindi Sullivan, to ensure any damage to the root system during the construction will not kill the tree.

Mr. Milburn will conduct a City-wide sidewalk audit during the 1st quarter of 2015

## **CITATION OFFICER'S REPORT: KENNY BETTS**

Mr. Betts patrolled 112 miles during the month of October and issued 10 Hi Neighbor notices.

## **CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT: JOHN SINGLER**

Mr. Singler recommended setting a bond limit of \$300,000.00 for Mayor Davis. The Council concurred and a bond application will be filed.

Oaths of Office and Financial Disclosure Statements were given to the newly elected Council and must be completed by January 1, 2015.

Mayor Davis submitted a "No Conflict of Interest" statement from Nationwide Insurance, a company the Mayor represents in his personal business. This statement will be filed accordingly.

## **PUBLIC WORKS: LOUIE SCHWEICKHARDT**

No Report.

## **SPECIAL EVENTS: TALBOTT ALLEN**

The City-wide holiday party, the St. Regis Park Annual Holiday Extravaganza, will take place on Sunday, December 7, 2014, from 4:30 – 6:00 p.m. Complete details will be outlined in a newsletter flyer. While the City will not host a formal "Light-Up," the City will sponsor a "House Decoration Contest." The City will provide prizes and recognition based on input from independent judges.

Mr. Shackelford obtained budgetary figures for a City-wide leaf collection program and will continue to seek feedback from residents.

**OLD BUSINESS:**

Mr. Wheatley will follow-up on the Ascension banner project.

**NEW BUSINESS:**

The City files were purged in accordance with retention guidelines and shredded by Greenway Shredding at no cost. Thanks to Council Members Willett, Allen, Graves, Schweickhardt and City Clerk Bill Hodapp for taking time to complete the task.

There being no further business, Mr. Hoard made a motion to adjourn. The motion was seconded by Mr. Graves. The motion passed without dissent. The meeting adjourned at 9:04 p.m.

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## INFORMATION TO IMPROVE HOMEOWNERSHIP

***We just closed on our house, but now we have come to the realization we just cannot afford the mortgage payments. What do we do?***

If nothing has changed – and if you still have the same job making the same income – RELAX! You wouldn't have gotten approved for the loan unless you could afford it. That is unless you didn't disclose all your financial obligations to the lender – did you?

Buyer's remorse and first time homeowner's jitters may be what you are feeling. Just give yourself time to adjust to the bigger monthly payment. Buying your first home is like having a baby – everything changes – and you're going to lose some sleep over it – but you will survive.

The first thing you should do is set up a budget for yourself and yes, you may have to give up that gym membership – cut back on your cable channels and eat out less – but you can afford your house because if you couldn't you wouldn't have been approved for the loan. Also, keep in mind that your sacrifices will pay off in a big tax write-off at the end as well as your first step to build equity for the down payment of your next home.

If the reason is due to the recent loss of your job – you should call the lender right away. You may have to put the house back on the market if you can't find a way to make your payments.

Letting the lender know in advance may give you some extra time to sell your home before they start foreclosure proceedings.

The first year of home ownership is critical. Miss a mortgage payment and your lender may start foreclosure proceedings immediately which can be extremely damaging to your credit and could even keep you from purchasing your next home for possibly five years.

And last – if this is due to not disclosing all your debt and financial obligations to the lender – that is going to be a much bigger problem for both you and your lender. If that's the case, you may want to contact an attorney right away before you miss your first mortgage payment. Missed mortgage payments are a huge RED FLAG for possible mortgage fraud, especially when payments are missed in the first twelve months.

Remember, a home is a place of your own where you can feel safe and secure, to enjoy with your family and friends, and in many instances, is a very good investment.

# PUBLIC SAFETY CORNER

## HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

The City of St. Regis Park Public Safety Department would like to wish everyone a safe and happy holiday season. Here are a few Holiday Safety Tips:

### **PERSONAL SAFETY**

Dress casually and comfortably. Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.

Shop with friends and family. Try not to shop alone, especially at night. Walk in well-lit areas.

Avoid carrying too many packages that put you off balance and make you an easy target.

Never go home if you think you are being followed or if you feel threatened. Go to a busy well-lit Safe Place or the nearest police or fire department.

Your safety is a priority. Property can be replaced. Comply with a thief's demands. Record an accurate description for law enforcement: height, weight, skin, hair, and eye color, scars, tattoos, clothing, and license plates.

Teach your children what to do if you get separated. Tell them to find a store clerk or security personnel for assistance. If possible, have them memorize your phone number.

Tell someone where you are going and how long you will be gone. Let them know if you change your schedule.

Hold your purse close to your body or use a front pocket if you carry a wallet.

### **VEHICLE SAFETY**

Park close to the store. Avoid dark and secluded areas.

Keep doors locked and windows closed.

Remember where you park your car. Be aware of suspicious cars and people.

Have your car keys in your hand when returning to your car.

Never leave packages visible inside your car. Store them in the trunk. Put your packages in the trunk before you drive to your next location, not when you arrive.

### **HOME BURGLARY PROTECTION**

Make your home appear as if someone is always at home.

Set timers to turn lights in your home on and off at various times.

Temporarily stop mail and newspaper deliveries, or have a trusted neighbor pick them up if you are going to be away for a few days. Request your home be placed on the St. Regis Park Housewatch List by contacting City Hall at 491-7777 or by email to: [cityofstregispark@mcmahanfire.com](mailto:cityofstregispark@mcmahanfire.com).

Have a trusted friend or neighbor keep an eye on your home. If you plan to travel for the holidays, don't discuss your plans with strangers and avoid putting details on social media.

Leave an emergency contact number with someone you trust.

Close all window coverings (blinds, drapes, etc.).

Leave a radio on with a "talk radio" station.

Thoroughly secure your property. Lock all doors and windows, even if you plan to be gone for only a few minutes.

Talk to your neighbors about being aware of suspicious persons or vehicles.

As we move toward December and people are thinking about Christmas trees, your Tree Board is still thinking about all kinds of trees! Here's what's happening that might interest you:

1. On Monday night, November 17th, at 7 PM at the McMahan Fire House, you are invited to come meet the appointed Tree Board members and our new city Consulting Arborist, Cindi Sullivan, hear about the mission and vision of our work, and have a chance to ask questions about your existing or future trees. We hope you will join us for this one-hour meeting.
2. Elsewhere in this newsletter, you will see information about the exciting one-time donation of trees to St. Regis Park by **Jim and Mary Wallitsch of Wallitsch Nursery**. If you are interested in trying to "win" one, call the city phone at 491-7777, and leave your name and phone number, or email the tree board via [msmattingly@twc.com](mailto:msmattingly@twc.com). Additionally, you may sign up at the Tree Board public meeting on Monday, November 17th.

Here are the trees we think will be available, and information about their size and characteristics.

## Wallitsch Tree Selections—Fall 2015

### *Acer ginnala* Amur Maple 'Flame'

A small maple, single or multistemmed, reaching 15x15 feet, high and wide, with red fall color.

### *Cornus x Venus* Venus Dogwood

A backcross of Kousa Dogwood; 18'x 25' with dark green leaves and huge white bracts.

### *Franklinia alatamaha* Franklinia

Named after Ben Franklin; a small tree 10-20'x 6-15', very nice bark, lustrous dark green leaves in summer with excellent fall color; blooms in summer with pretty white 3 inch flowers.

### *Pyrus calleryana* 'Jack'

Compact, 15x10, white flowers, yellow green fruit and nice green summer color; yellow fall color.

### *Syringa reticulata* Japanese Tree Lilac 'Ivory Silk'

A small-medium tree, reaching 20-30 'high and 15-25' wide. It features creamy white flowers panicles in late spring that are very showy because they can reach almost a foot long. Disease resistant.

### *Quercus macrocarpa* Bur Oak, Mossycup Oak

One of the best of the large oaks; 70-80' high and wide but slow growing. Deeply furrowed, dark gray ridged bark; yellow fall color; interesting acorns.

3. And finally, as we approach Christmas, this might be your year to buy a live Christmas tree and plant it in your yard after Christmas. Evergreens provide year-round beauty and environmental benefits. If you have questions about planting your Christmas tree, bring them to the Tree Board meeting.

We hope to see you on the 17th!

## St. Regis Park Tree Board Lottery

Through the generosity of **Wallitsch Nursery**, St. Regis Park has been given about a dozen larger trees (6-8 feet tall, 1 ½ - 2 inches in diameter, in 15-gallon containers) to distribute by lottery to citizens who do not have a significant-sized tree in their front or visible corner side lawn. **This is a one-time only offer of a free tree.** Each year **Wallitsch Nursery** at 2608 Hikes Lane donates trees they don't want to over-winter to Metro Parks, but this year, because of their close connection to our city, and the work the City of St. Regis Park is doing to enhance its tree canopy, they have chosen to give us the trees. The city is using funds already budgeted for tree work this year, to have the trees professionally planted by **Wallitsch**.

Here's how it will work:

1. Citizens who are eligible and interested in a tree may **call the city phone line (502-491-7777)** and leave their name, address, and phone number, or **email the Tree Board via [msmattingly@twc.com](mailto:msmattingly@twc.com)** with the same information. Additionally, residents may **sign up at the Tree Board public meeting on Monday, November 17, 7:00 PM at the McMahan Fire Department.**
2. We ask that you enter this lottery **only** if you need a tree to help our tree canopy—that is, if you do not have a tree of significant size in your front or (corner house) visible side yard.
3. If you are randomly selected, Cindi Sullivan, our city arborist, will verify that your lawn needs a tree of the size and variety available,

and that you still want it. Then she will call BUD -- Before You Dig -- to have your utilities marked so that Cindi can place a stake where you and she think the tree belongs, and **Wallitsch** will come plant it. You will be asked to sign an agreement to water and care for the tree to the best of your ability.

4. **You must submit your name by noon on Wednesday, November 26th, to be eligible. The drawing will be held at that approximate time.**
5. The first-name drawn will have the first choice of trees, and on down the line. If you do not care to have the available tree, we will draw again. Here is a list of the trees that we believe will be available, and their approximate mature size:

- 4 – Dwarf Jack Pear (*Pyrus calleryana*)
- 2 – Franklinia (*Franklinia alatamaha*)
- 1 – Ivory Silk Lilac (*Syringa reticulata*)
- 1 – Venus Dogwood (*Cornus x Venus*)
- 3 – Amur Flame Maple (*Acer ginnala*)
- 2 – Bur Oak (*Quercus macrocarpa*)
