Dear Fellow Residents:

Another year has almost passed. 2013 will shortly be in the history books. It is hard to believe 2014 will be arriving in the next few weeks. As I look back at this past year, it is very important to thank my fellow Council Members for the countless hours they contributed toward making the City of St. Regis Park a great place to live and to enjoy. Thank you for another outstanding year.

And to all the residents who came forward to talk with us on various issues, one-on-one and at the City Council Meetings, thank you for your input. We couldn't accomplish all we did, and be the City we are, without your efforts and support. We represent you and need your thoughts, ideas and comments in order to serve you better.

Much was accomplished during 2013. Capital projects included repairing our sidewalks and replacing all of the traffic control signs. A sanitation contract was successfully negotiated with no increase to residents, and property taxes remained the same. Additional police protection was provided for the security of our City and all its residents. The annual city-wide yard sale, the 4th of July observance, and the return of "Light Up St. Regis Park" were all community events which hopefully brought us closer together. As I have often said, the City of St. Regis Park is a great place to live and together, we can make it even better.

Most of you are aware of the two recent house fires within the past few weeks, one on Ashfield Lane and the other on Statton Road. Both were presumably caused by electrical issues. Although these particular houses were in one of the older sections of St. Regis Park, the McMahan Fire Protection District has offered to inspect any residence in the City free of charge to determine its safety. Aluminum wiring should not exist, and fuse boxes should be converted to circuit breakers. In addition, McMahan Fire will check smoke detectors, change the batteries in smoke detectors (if any resident is unable to do so

themselves), and even provide smoke detectors at no charge. To schedule an inspection, please call McMahan Fire at 491-4745.

While on the subject of safety, the 6th District of the Louisville Metro Police advises robberies and home break-ins increase significantly during the holiday season. Front porch lights and lights on your garage act as significant deterrents to potential thieves. In addition, it is important that all residents be alert to any suspicious behavior. Law enforcement should be contacted at either 574-2111 or 311, or in the event of an emergency, call 911.

Since this is our final newsletter for 2013, I want to express to each of you what an honor it has been for me to serve as your mayor this past year. With your help, we shall continue to make St. Regis Park a city we are all proud to live in.

May your Holidays be filled with all you wish, and may we each have a Happy New Year and a prosperous 2014!

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR
MONTHLY COUNCIL MEETING
Tuesday, December 3, 2013

Following are the Minutes of the monthly Council Meeting for the City of St. Regis Park, held at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, December 3, 2013, at 4318 Taylorsville Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40220.

ROLL CALL:

Present: Davis, Allen, Dietz, Graves, Hoard, Schweickhardt, Wheatley, Willett.
Absent: None

MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Brandt Davis called the meeting to order and turned the floor over to Colonel Pat Walsh, Chief of the McMahan Fire District. Chief Walsh addressed the recent house fire on Statton Road in November. The home was not equipped with working smoke detectors. The end result could have been much worse had the occupants been unable to exit from a walkout door in the basement. The fire was believed to have been caused by faulty wiring.

Chief Walsh stressed the importance of ensuring working smoke detectors are in every residence. His department will make a courtesy visit to any St. Regis Park home to ensure the detectors are working and properly placed. Contact Chief Walsh at 491-4745 to schedule a walk through.

In addition, the Mayor and City Council want to ensure the owners of all properties classified as "rentals" are informed working smoke detectors should be in every home. This will be addressed when the City sends out the annual rental property invoice to those owners.

Chief Walsh also informed the Council a person(s) is setting fires to wreaths on doors in areas around St. Regis Park. This has been taking place for the past year. There have been over 30 fires in the areas around our City occurring during the early morning hours. **If you see or hear anything suspicious, please contact Louisville Metro Police.**

Mr. Bob Graves encouraged residents to keep on all exterior lighting at night.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Charlie Venneman, the City's accountant, presented the Financial Report for November 2013. Total Revenues for the month were \$21,099.63, and the General Fund's total revenues for the year-to-date were \$305,637.97.

Total Expenses for the month were \$21,304.57. The General Fund's total expenses for the year-to-date were \$122,003.13 resulting in excess revenue over expenses of \$183,634.84.

Revenues for the Road Fund were \$2,946.33 as of November 30, with no incurred expenses during the month. The Road Fund balance was \$15,426.81 as of November 30. Complete financials are posted on the City's website at www.stregispark.net.

As of December 1, there were nine (9) delinquent property tax bills. Those properties will be listed in the monthly newsletter.

The Council discussed implementing an investment policy for City funds. Mr. John Singler, the City's attorney, introduced several examples. The Council will await Mr. Venneman's review of the documents. No action will be taken until the January 2014 meeting.

Councilman Greg Dietz informed the Council the average 2013 home sale price in the City was \$222,817.39.

The 2012-2013 financial audit is being done by Goodman and Associates, CPAs, and should be completed by December 31.

Mr. Graves made a motion to accept the November 2013 Financial Report as presented. Ms. Cheryl Willett seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING:

Mr. Stephen Hoard made a motion to approve the Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting held November 5, 2013. Mr. Dietz seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

POLICE REPORT:

LMPD Officer Kenneth Betts, representing Kentuckiana Law Enforcement (KLE), was present and distributed several safety bulletins. The November 2013 Small City Activity Report will be published in the monthly newsletter.

Officer Betts will ensure there are 2 officers in the area during Light Up St. Regis Park on December 14. One officer will patrol while the other will monitor traffic on Browns Lane at the church entrance.

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT: MEL MILBURN (Not Present)

No report.

CITATION OFFICER'S REPORT: DREW AMON (Not Present)

Mr. Amon reported 42 miles were patrolled during the

month of November, and four (4) Hi Neighbor notices were issued.

CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT: JOHN SINGLER

Mr. Singler introduced the First Reading of **ORDINANCE NO. 5, SERIES 2013-2014, AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A TREE BOARD AND RELATING TO THE PLANTING, MAINTENANCE AND REMOVAL OF TREES AND SHRUBS WITHIN THE CITY OF ST. REGIS PARK.** After discussion and changes, Mr. Singler read a summary of the Ordinance. Mr. Louie Schweickhardt made a motion to approve the First Reading. Mr. Hoard seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

SPECIAL EVENTS – TALBOTT ALLEN

Light Up St. Regis Park will take place on Saturday, December 14. Mr. Allen and the Council discussed the presented action plan and ensured all assignments were addressed.

The Ascension Youth Ministry group assembled and distributed the luminary candle kits to all residents. A donation of \$1,000 was made to the organization for their efforts.

Mr. Frank Wheatley will work to establish a St. Regis Park e-mail blast for Light Up St. Regis Park and encouraged everyone to add their email addresses by completing the signup process on the City website.

PUBLIC SAFETY – CHERYL WILLETT

Ms. Willett reviewed the monthly police report and ensured there will be two officers on duty during Light Up.

Pronounced Block-us ages 5 + up

An abstract strategy game with transparent, Tetris-shaped, colored pieces that players are trying to place on the board. The only caveat to placing a piece is that it may not lie adjacent to your other pieces, but instead, must be placed touching at least one corner of your pieces already on the board.



Qwirkle

This abstract game consists of 108 wooden blocks with six different shapes in six different colors. There is no board; players simply use an available flat surface. Players begin the game with 6 blocks. The start player places blocks of a single matching attribute (color or shape but not both) on the table. Thereafter, a player adds blocks next to at least one previously played block. The blocks must all be played in a line and match, without duplicates, either the color or shape of the previous block.

A HISTORY OF NEW YEAR'S

New Year's Day is probably the world's most celebrated public holiday, often observed with fireworks at the stroke of midnight, as the New Year starts in each time zone. In fact, civilizations around the world have been celebrating the start of each new year for at least 4,000 years.

In 46 B.C., the Roman Emperor Julius Caesar first established January 1 as New Year's Day. Caesar felt that the month named after the Roman god Janus with two faces, one looking forward and one back, would be appropriate to the New Year. In later years, Roman pagans observed the New Year by engaging in drunken orgies.

As Christianity spread, pagan holidays were either incorporated into the Christian calendar or abandoned altogether. After William the Conqueror became King of England on December 25, 1066, he decreed that the English return to the date established by the Roman pagans, January 1. William's innovation was eventually rejected, and England rejoined the rest of the Christian world and returned to celebrating New Year's Day on March 25, Annunciation Day. Annunciation Day commemorates the angel Gabriel's announcement to Mary that she would conceive a son to be called Jesus.

In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII abandoned the traditional Julian calendar because of a slight inaccuracy. The Julian calendar had slipped behind the seasons about one day per century. Pope Gregory made a correction by advancing the calendar ten days. The Gregorian calendar differs from the Julian in three ways: (1) no century year is a leap year unless it is exactly divisible by 400; (2) years divisible by 4000 are common (not leap) years; and (3) once again the New Year would begin with the date set by the early pagans, the first day of the month of Janus – January 1.

Today, most New Year festivities begin on December 31 (New Year's Eve), the last day of the Gregorian calendar, and continue into the early hours of January 1 (New Year's Day). Common traditions include attending parties, eating special New Year's foods, making resolutions and watching fireworks displays. We wish each of you a safe and **HAPPY NEW YEAR'S.**



ARE YOU WILLING TO SERVE?

The City of St. Regis Park is considering the establishment of a **Tree Board** which would consist of no more than five (5) voting members, but not less than three (3). The members would be appointed by the Mayor, with the consent and approval of the City Council, for staggered, three year terms. The **Tree Board** members would serve without compensation and attend regularly scheduled meetings to be held at least quarterly.

The **Tree Board** would study, develop, update annually and administer a written *Annual Tree Work Plan*, the cost of implementation of which would be within an annual budget submitted and approved by the St. Regis Park City Council as part of its annual budget cycle each year. The plan would address species diversity, planting needs, hazardous trees, insect and disease problems, preservation, pruning, planting, replanting, removal of trees and shrubs along streets and other public areas and a pattern of regular care such as pruning and watering. This plan would be presented annually to the City Council for their review, acceptance and approval. Additional assignments may be made by the City Council to research, investigate, consider, and make findings and report upon any other matters in relation to trees and tree preservation.

AMENDMENT XXII*

To the Constitution of the United States of America

Section 1. No person shall be elected to the office of the President more than twice, and no person who has held the office of President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of President more than once. But this article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this Article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President, or acting as President, during the term within which this Article becomes operative from holding the office of President or acting as President during the remainder of such term.

Section 2. This Article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress.

PUBLIC SAFETY CORNER

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

The Ohio River Valley is well known for rapidly changing weather conditions. Winter weather provides new challenges to both the public and law enforcement. Driving on snowy or icy roads requires special attention to safety. Although it is impossible to have ideal road conditions 365 days a year, certain precautions should be taken to make winter driving safer. Here are some tips and suggestions to help you get ready for the hazards of winter.

Before the Trip:

- Winterize your car with fresh antifreeze, a good battery, a properly operating exhaust system and oil that will withstand the rigors of winter.
- If possible, avoid driving until the roads are safe and passable. You don't want to slide off the road, and highway crews don't want to plow around disabled vehicles.
- Do a thorough pretrip inspection of your vehicle, paying special attention to your tires, brakes, windshield wipers and windshield wiper fluid.

Equip Your Vehicle With:

- A flashlight with extra batteries.
- A first-aid kit.
- Necessary medications.
- Blankets and/or sleeping bags.
- Extra mittens or gloves, socks, a warm cap and rain gear.
- A small sack of sand to use for traction under your wheels and a small shovel.
 - Booster cables.
 - Small tools – pliers, wrench, screwdrivers.
 - A brightly colored cloth as a flag to signal for assistance.
 - Nonperishable foods and bottled water.

During the Trip:

- Obey speed limits; don't speed. Use common sense, and adjust your speed and following distance to suit driving conditions.
- Give snowplows plenty of room, and don't pass them.
- Always wear your seat belt.
- Remember that driving is most dangerous when temperatures are near 32 degrees.
- Watch for other vehicles having problems with road conditions.
- Keep mirrors, windows and lights clean; keep your lights on.
- Don't pass other vehicles on or near bridges.
- Keep your fuel tank at least half full.
- If you don't feel comfortable driving, pull off the highway and park at the first safe place.

Collision Information:

- Be patient. Bad weather also limits the capabilities of law enforcement officers and emergency crews and increases response time. Also keep in mind, there will be a high volume of requests for emergency service.
- Attempt to move your vehicle out of the roadway if you are involved in a minor, non-injury traffic collision, especially if you are in a dangerous area such as a curve or a blind hill.
- If your vehicle is stranded or wrecked but not in the roadway, for safety considerations, attempts to recover your vehicle will have to wait until conditions improve.



LOCAL ALERT

The McMahan Fire District has again reminded us there continue to be a number of suspicious fires in the district. Unfortunately, the perpetrator(s) has not yet been apprehended. As outlined in last month's newsletter, these usually occur during the early morning hours between 2:00 and 4:00 am, and in many instances, door decorations and flags are targeted. During this Holiday Season, all citizens should be vigilant and remain on high alert. The perpetrator(s) seems to blend into the community. **Any** suspicious behavior should immediately be reported to law enforcement.

HOW WELL DO YOU KNOW YOUR NEIGHBOR?

In keeping with Kentucky's version of "Megan's Law," the Kentucky State Police is now providing sex/criminal offender information on its website. The intent of this site is public awareness. This database is made available to alert possible victims of potential danger, not to punish or embarrass offenders. Convicted sex/criminal offenders have always lived in our communities. Only in recent years have laws been passed which have required these offenders to register with authorities. Unfortunately, many convicted offenders do re-offend. There is an overriding public interest and need to insure the safety of the public by providing registered offender information. It is important to note that not all criminal offenses require registration with the state police, only those covered by statute.

Refinance to Remove a Person

Most people are familiar with the reasons a homeowner refinances their home which generally result in two major benefits: saving interest and building equity.

There is, however, another reason to refinance which may not be as common which is to remove a person from the existing loan. In the case of a divorce, when one party wants to keep the home and the other party wants their equity out of the home, it is possible for the remaining party to refinance the home. If the equity is sufficient to justify it and the remaining owner can qualify for the new loan, the refinance can provide the proceeds to buy out the other spouse.

Refinancing to remove a person from the loan could also involve a situation where two or more heirs jointly own a property and have differing opinions on when to sell. The same situation could also apply to a rental property with multiple owners, and the refinance would provide a way to buy out a partner.

Sometimes, it's not about taking cash out of the home to buy out the other party. If a person's name is on the mortgage, they're responsible if it goes to default. One party may be willing to deed the home to the other party but it doesn't necessarily relieve them of the liability of the mortgage they originated.

Many times, once a person has made up their mind to move on, they'll take the fastest and easiest way out. Removing the person from a deed or a mortgage is a reason to consider obtaining legal advice to protect your interests.

Reasons to Refinance:

1. Lower the rate;
2. Shorten the term;
3. Take cash out of equity;
4. Combine loans;
5. Remove a person from a loan.
