Dear Fellow Residents:

As we start the New Year and as the Council and I begin our new terms of office, we come together in our shared commitment to making the City of St. Regis Park an even better place to live.

We have achieved many of the goals we set for this past year. The City Council continued to demonstrate their commitment to fiscal responsibility. The property tax rate for the City was reduced; the Sanitation Tax remained the same as in recent years; the City's contract with Rumpke Waste and Recycling Services was extended through June 30, 2017 with no decrease in services and no increase in cost. The yellow curbing at all intersections and fire hydrants was repainted as were the individual house numbers on the curbs. Additional police protection was provided for the security of our City and all its residents. Social events included the July 4th observance, the ice cream social, the annual city-wide yard sale, and the Annual Holiday Extravaganza – all community events which hopefully brought us closer together.

A special thank you to Councilman Talbott Allen for spearheading this year's Holiday Extravaganza. He and Councilwoman Cheryl Willett did a magnificent job organizing what I believe was the best holiday party ever. More residents attended than ever before, with copious amounts of pizza, sub-sandwiches, cookies and brownies being consumed. Ms. Holly Smith directed the Ascension School Youth Choir who entertained with a variety of carols and musical numbers, and the one and only Santa Claus listened to children's wants and posed for pictures. Numerous door prizes were drawn for the enjoyment of both the adults and children who were present.

As of this writing the judging of the House Decoration Contests has not yet occurred. However, in driving through the City, I believe more residents have decorated this year than ever before. Without question, St. Regis Park truly has the Holiday Spirit. Our panel of impartial and independent judges certainly has their work cut out for them.

I want to also extend a special thank you to the members of the City of St. Regis Park Tree Board – Jane Ecker, Joe Hinkle and Mary Mattingly, as well as the City's Consulting Arborist, Cindi Sullivan. They have pursued the challenge presented to them with enthusiasm and professionalism moving forward toward achieving the goal of meeting the Tree City USA program standards.

Along those same lines, the recent Tree Board Lottery was a resounding success. Almost 30 households responded. Although there were not enough trees available to accommodate all, the lucky 13 winners are listed elsewhere in the newsletter. Congratulations to those residents.

Brightside, the Greater Louisville nonprofit partner that promotes beautification and tree planting, has identified tree benefits as economic, environmental and social. Well-placed trees help both businesses and homeowners save on air-conditioning in the summer. Shoppers in tree-lined commercial districts shop more frequently, have longer trips, and are willing to spend more on goods. Trees also increase property values.

Environmentally, trees improve our air quality, absorb carbon dioxide to produce oxygen, and by saving energy, can reduce air pollution. They also reduce storm water in sewers, meaning fewer overflows, and reduce urban heat, the heat produced by buildings, parking lots and road surfaces.

Socially, trees seem to reduce crime rates by creating a safer and more closely knit community through beautification and civic pride. These social, economic, and environmental benefits will increase the quality of life for all residents of St. Regis Park.

Of course, trees also produce leaves. Last month we requested your opinion on the possibility of the City offering a leaf collection service similar to those in St. Matthews and Lyndon. With more than 600 residences in St. Regis Park, the responses, both pro and con, were less than 5%. Several residents expressed their pride in ownership and felt any community collection would not occur often enough. Others felt they would prefer to have their private landscape companies perform that service. Several further possibilities will be explored to determine whether or not such a collection is both viable and economically feasible in the future.

Winter conditions are here and everyone should be aware of not only changes in driving conditions, but also home safety. Use caution with candles, space heaters and fireplaces. Make sure your home has working smoke detectors and a home escape plan.

Throughout the New Year, there will be new items and ideas to be considered for improvements to our City. I strongly believe in an open government and to providing our residents insight into future concerns. I will always welcome input regarding the City and local developments.

May the New Year be healthy, happy and prosperous to all.

Following are the Minutes of the regular monthly Council Meeting for the City of St. Regis Park, held at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, December 2, 2014, at 4318 Taylorsville Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40220.

ROLL CALL:

Present: Mayor Brandt Davis; Council Members: Talbott Allen, Bob Graves, Louie Schweickhardt, Frank Wheatley, Cheryl Willett.

Absent: Stephen Hoard, Eric Shackelford.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Davis introduced Mr. John McIntyre of McIntyre & Wooldridge, PSC, Certified Public Accountants. Mr. McIntyre presented the City of St. Regis Park Annual Financial Report for the year ended June 30, 2014, and the Auditor's Communication to the Mayor and Council with the required supplemental data to be published in the January 2015 newsletter. Mr. Graves made a motion to accept the audit report as presented. Mr. Wheatley seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Charlie Veeneman, City Accountant, presented the Financial Report for November 2014. The General Fund revenues for the month were \$25,101.72 with year-to-date revenues at \$302,827.45. Total expenses for the month were \$20,220.01 with year-to-date expenses at \$114,976.01, resulting in year-to-date excess revenue over expenses of \$187,851.44.

The Road Fund revenues for the month were \$2,964.66 with year-to-date revenues at \$15,144.12. Total expenses for the month were \$0 with year-to-date expenses at \$1,485.00, resulting in year-to-date excess revenue of \$13,659.12.

Ms. Willett made a motion to approve the November 2014 Financial Report. Mr. Allen seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent. Complete financials are posted on the City's website at www.stregispark.net.

The Council agreed to have \$240,000.00 transferred from the River City Bank Tax Account to the River City Bank Money Market Account.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING:

Mr. Allen made a motion to approve the Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting held on November 4, 2014. Mr. Schweickhardt seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

POLICE REPORT:

LMPD Officer Kori Thurman was present representing Kentuckiana Law Enforcement (KLE). The Small City Activity Report for November had earlier been distributed to the Council electronically and will be published in the monthly newsletter.

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT: MEL MILBURN (Absent)

The Council recommended the sidewalk at 4524 Dannywood Road be repaired using best practices to eliminate the hazard and preserve the tree.

CITATION OFFICER'S REPORT: KENNY BETTS

Mr. Betts patrolled 84 miles and issued 6 Hi-Neighbor notices during the month of November.

CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT: JOHN SINGLER

No Report.

PUBLIC WORKS – LOUIE SCHWEICKHARDT

MSD completed repairs on the storm drain grate on Statton Road. Mr. Schweickhardt stated that the Tree Board will submit their Minutes to Mr. Graves for publication in the newsletter.



INFORMATION TO IMPROVE HOMEOWNERSHIP

ENJOY YOUR IMPROVEMENTS AND PROFIT BY THEM

Homeowners can raise the basis or cost in their home by money spent on capital improvements. The benefit is that it will lower their gain and may save them taxes when they sell their home.

Improvements must add value to your home, prolong the useful life or adapt it to new uses. Repairs are routine in nature to maintain the value and keep the property in an ordinary, operating condition.

Additions of decks, pools, fences and landscaping add value to a home as well as new floor covering, counter-tops and other updates. Replacing a roof, appliances or heating and cooling systems would be considered to extend the useful life of the home. Completing an unfinished basement or converting a garage to living space are common examples of adapting a portion of the home to a new use.

Other items that can raise the basis in your home are special assessments for local improvements like sidewalks or curbs and money spent to restore damage from casualty losses not covered by insurance.

Here's a simple idea that could save you money years from now.

Every time you spend money on your home other than the house payment and the utilities, put the receipt or canceled check in an envelope labeled "Home Improvements." Regardless

of whether you know if the money would be classified as maintenance or improvements, the receipt or canceled check goes in the envelope.

Years from now, when you've sold your home and need to report the gain on the property, you or your accountant can go through the envelope and determine which of the expenditures will be adjustments to your basis.

Some people disregard this idea because of the generous exclusion allowed on principle residences. At the unknown point in the future when you sell your home, circumstances may have changed and the proof of these expenditures will be valuable. The tax laws could lower the exclusion amount or eliminate it altogether. Your marital status may change because of death or divorce. The market value of your home may skyrocket.

Since the future is unknown, it is better to keep track of the improvements as they are made and how much is spent on them. Remember, a home is a place of your own where you can feel safe and secure, to enjoy with your family and friends, and in many instances, is a very good investment.

Independent Auditor's Report

The Honorable Mayor and
Council of the City of
St. Regis Park, Kentucky

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of the City of St. Regis Park, Kentucky as of and for the year ended June 30, 2014, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risk of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the City of St. Regis Park, Kentucky at June 30, 2014, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters


Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's budgetary comparison information on page 17 & 18 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Management has omitted the Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America has required to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Our opinion on the basic financial statements is not affected by this missing information.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Governmental Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated November 24, 2014 on our consideration of the City of St. Regis Park, Kentucky's internal control over financial reporting and on our test of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the result of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Governmental Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

CHANGE TO YARD WASTE COLLECTION

EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2015

In May 2014, the Louisville-Jefferson County Waste Management District adopted a yard waste container regulation clarifying collection procedures. Residents who utilize yard waste collection services must use one of the following approved containers: **reusable bin clearly labeled "Yard Waste"** (residents may contact Rumpke to inquire about a rolling cart option), **paper yard waste bags**, or **compostable plastic bags meeting D6400 standards**.

When the rule is enforced January 1, 2015, yard waste will not be collected if it is not in one of the approved containers, and residents could be fined. For more information, visit the City of Louisville website. The ban applies county-wide, including the City of St. Regis Park, however, for our City, yard waste pickup ended December 30 and will not resume until **March 3, 2015**

RECYCLING REMINDER – PLEASE NO PLASTIC BAGS

Please combine all accepted recyclables **unbagged** in your Rumpke recycling container. Return plastic shopping bags to the store to recycle them separately.

STOP FIRES BEFORE THEY START!

Make your New Year's resolution for safety. Reduce the chances for a fire to start in your home.

CANDLES – Make certain that you always blow out candles when you leave a room or go to sleep. Unattended candles have started many fires over the past year.

HEATING – Try to keep everything that can burn at least one foot away from heaters. Clothes, blankets, newspapers and furniture can start a fire if they are too close to a heater.

COOKING – Never leave food unattended while cooking. Many people lose more than their meal when they forget they are cooking.

KIDS – Keep matches and lighters away from small children. Put them away in places where they are out of sight and out of the reach of little hands.

SMOKING – Remind friends and family that smoking while in bed or when sleepy is dangerous. Provide your guests and family with large ashtrays and empty the ashes when they are cool.

911 – It is important that everyone in your home knows how to call 911 for emergency help. Place 911 stickers on all of your phones and make certain small children know their home address.

Minutes of the St. Regis Park Tree Board Meeting

First public meeting, November 17, 2014 7 PM

Present: Jane Ecker, Joe Hinkle and Mary Mattingly, Board Members; Cindi Sullivan, City Consulting Arborist; several City Council members; a number of concerned citizens.

All members of the Board and Cindi introduced themselves.

Cindi showed the map and all of the tools that she has used to survey the trees in the City—she has listed, described, and roughly measured all front and visible side yard trees in the City. Her procedure included walking the City twice and checking up on questionable areas two more times as well. Cindi noted that our “community of trees” is ever-changing, so no survey is static.

Now Cindi is working on analyzing the data and recommending trees that should be planted. By the time of our Arbor Day public meeting in March or April, we are hoping that citizens will be able to look up their home on Cindi’s map and see if she recommends that they add more trees or treat existing ones.

Joe presented the Tree Board’s Mission and Vision Statements:

Vision Statement of the St. Regis Park Tree Board:

Our vision is a City that has an appropriately full and healthy tree canopy.

Mission Statement:

The Tree Board and its City Arborist support the Mayor and City Council in providing information, education, and incentives for developing a healthy tree canopy by maintaining existing trees and planting new ones.

Mary provided information about requests that will be made to the City Council in January or February. Our hope is to request funding from the City toward the planting of new trees, treating trees in poor health, and removing dangerous trees.

Jane reiterated the information about the Wallitsch Tree Lottery. Names are due November 26th at noon from citizens who do not have a tree of substantial size in their front yard. The names of the winners will be published in the upcoming newsletter.

Cindi answered questions from residents.

Discussion was held about whether we should next provide incentives for front yard new trees, maintenance of existing trees, or proceed with the back yard survey first. The Board is inclined to recommend that perhaps a year of incentives come first.

Questions about when individuals can see their tree situation [the next Tree Board public meeting in March or April], whether grants or neighborhood development funds would be available [the Board will pursue these], how to select tree trimmers [Cindi will come up with some recommendations], and next steps, [incentives and 2015 budget requests; Arbor Day celebration] were asked and answered.

The next meeting will occur in March or April, the date to be announced.

BRANCHING OUT

The Tree Board’s first public meeting was held on Monday, November 17th. Coming on the heels of our first snow of the season, it was sparsely attended, but those attending were able to meet the members of the Board and our consulting arborist, Cindi Sullivan, hear a description of the front yard tree survey, and ask questions about trees or the city’s future tree plans. The minutes of that meeting are elsewhere in this newsletter.

While we have been brainstorming ways to “Re-Tree the Park,” our working tagline, we have been thrilled to see the first actual results of our endeavors: the 13 trees generously donated by Mary and Jim Wallitsch of Wallitsch Nursery, and planted by Wallitsch, using funds allocated by the City Council for tree work this year. These trees—a mix of oaks, maples, flowering pears, a hybrid dogwood, and Franklin trees -- were awarded to the following households, drawn randomly:

- Bowling, Saddle Horn Court
- Peveler, Stormon Court
