Dear Fellow Residents:

It is with a great deal of sadness I must report the untimely death of a friend and long-term City of St. Regis Park Council Member, Jim Walsh. He passed away unexpectedly on Tuesday, June 4. Jim served on the City Council for a number of years under numerous administrations. The Walsh family has been and continues to play a vital role in our community. Our sincerest condolences to Nancy, Pat, Tim, Sara, and their families. Jim will be sorely missed.

At the June Council Meeting, Stephen Hoard of Mt. Vernon Road was appointed to fill the unexpired term of former Councilman, Bob Aldridge. Stephen and his wife, Bailey, have become most active in St. Regis Park since moving into the City more than a year ago. Stephen is a Construction Project Executive. His expertise and experience make him a perfect fit to oversee building permits for the City.

As a result of Jim Walsh's passing, we now have another vacancy to fill on the City Council. The position is being advertised in this newsletter and has also been posted on the City's website and Facebook page. Again, this is open to all residents who have lived in St. Regis Park for at least one year. You must also be at least 21 years old and a registered voter.

I reported last month a budget for the upcoming fiscal year had been tentatively approved and the property tax rates and sanitation fees would remain the same. Those ordinances were unanimously passed by the City Council. Copies of those ordinances are also being published in this newsletter.

Many residents have inquired about the large, 65 gallon, brown garbage cans that are seen on the curbs throughout the City on collection days. These are furnished to St. Regis Park residents **without charge**. If you wish to receive one of these containers, please contact Rumpke Waste Removal at 568-3800. The only stipulation is these must be placed on the curb. Rumpke will not pick up trash in these if they are in the rear of your house on collection day.

Summer is a time when many of our residents take extended vacations. If you are going to be away from home, even if it's only for a day or two, I encourage you

to contact Kentuckiana Law Enforcement (KLE) and place your residence on the HOUSE Watch list. Your home will be checked several times a day to insure all is secure. This will provide you with increased peace of mind and hopefully add to a more enjoyable vacation. MINUTES OF THE REGULAR
MONTHLY COUNCIL MEETING
Tuesday, June 4, 2013

Following are the Minutes of the monthly Council Meeting for the City of St. Regis Park held at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, June 4, 2013, at 4318 Taylorsville Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40220.

ROLL CALL:

Present: Davis, Allen, Schweickhardt, Wheatley, Willett
Absent: Graves
*Jim Walsh passed away on June 4, 2013.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Brandt Davis asked for a moment of silence to remember Councilman Jim Walsh who had passed away unexpectedly that morning. Mayor Davis and the Council decided because of Mr. Walsh's death the meeting would be conducted expediently and cover only the business required by law.

Prior to the meeting, the Council interviewed Mr. Stephen Hoard and Mr. Eric Shackelford to fill the open Council seat earlier vacated by Councilman Bob Aldridge. Mr. Louie Schweickhardt made a motion to appoint Mr. Hoard to the City Council. Mr. Talbott Allen seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent. Councilman Allen volunteered to swear in Mr. Hoard on or around June 7, 2013.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Charlie Veeneman, CPA, delivered the May 2013 Financial Report. Total revenues for the month were \$17,940.00. The General Fund's total revenues for the year-to-date through eleven months were \$379,993.17. Total expenses for the month were \$23,692.36. The General Fund's total expenses for the year-to-date were \$266,790.49 resulting in excess revenue over expenses of \$113,202.68. The General Fund balance as of May 31, 2013 was \$606,741.56.

Revenues for the Road Fund were \$3,265.19 as of May 31, with no incurred expenses during the month. The Road Fund balance for the year-to-date was \$16,859.58 through eleven months. Complete financials have been posted for review on the City's website, www.stregispark.net.

Ms. Cheryl Willett made a motion to accept the Financial Report as presented. Mr. Frank Wheatley

seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING:

Mr. Allen made a motion to approve the Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting held May 7, 2013. The motion was seconded by Ms. Willett. The motion passed without dissent.

POLICE REPORT:

LMPD Officer Kenneth Betts, was present representing Kentuckiana Law Enforcement (KLE) but had no comments. The Small City Activity Report will be published elsewhere in the newsletter.

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT – MEL MILBURN:

Mr. Mel Milburn stated he was trying to reach Flynn Brothers Paving to discuss the issues with the roadways but they were not responding.

CITATION OFFICER'S REPORT – ANDREW AMON:

Mr. Andrew Amon submitted his report to the City Clerk, Mr. Bill Hodapp, and had no other comments.

CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT – JOHN SINGLER:

Mr. John Singler opened the three (3) bids presented to the Council for the new signage for the City. Mr. Schweickhardt and Mr. Milburn will review the bids and make a recommendation to the Council at the July meeting. Copies of the bids may be obtained by contacting the City Clerk.

Mr. Singler presented the 2nd and Final reading of the following Ordinances:

- 1) Ordinance No. 7, Series 2012-2013 - Amended Budget for July 1, 2012 – June 30, 2013. Ms. Willett made a motion to accept the Ordinance as presented. Mr. Wheatley seconded the motion. A roll call vote was held and the motion passed, all present voting in favor of passage.
- 2) Ordinance No. 1, Series 2013-2014 – Assessment of an Ad Valorem Tax and Sanitation Tax. Mr. Allen made a motion to accept the Ordinance. Ms. Willett seconded the motion. A roll call vote was held. The motion passed unanimously.
- 3) Ordinance No. 2, Series 2013-2014 – Budget for 2013-2014. Ms. Willett made a motion to accept the Ordinance. Mr. Schweickhardt seconded the motion. A roll call vote was held and was unanimously passed.



INFORMATION TO IMPROVE HOMEOWNERSHIP

BREATHING EASIER

The benefits of regularly changing heating and air-conditioning filters are obvious to homeowners. The real challenge is creating a system to make sure it gets done.

A reasonable schedule would be to replace it with a new one-inch pleated filter every 60 -90 days. Households with shedding pets should consider replacing them every month. Some people change their filters every month when they pay their electric bill. A simple system would be to set a recurring appointment on your calendar like Outlook or Google.

Filters trap dust, mold, and bacteria which can directly affect the air quality and play havoc with your allergies. When a filter is dirty, it prevents proper airflow and allows dust, dirt, and allergens to blow through your home. Changing your filter regularly helps to avoid maintenance, improve equipment life, and produces increased energy savings.

When shopping for filters, it's understandable to look for the best bargain, but the cheapest price may not be the best choice. When purchasing, recognize that HEPA-rated and HEPA-type filters are not the same thing. HEPA stands for high-efficiency particulate air. A HEPA filter meets or exceeds standards for efficiency set by the U.S. Department of Energy. Most HVAC contractors recommend HEPA filters.

Some filters need to be changed monthly and other types have manufacturer recommendations of every three months. An alternative to disposable filters are the permanent, washable types. These will cost more initially but because you clean and reuse them, eventually, you'll recapture the cost and realize savings.

CITY OF ST. REGIS PARK
ORDINANCE NO 1, SERIES 2013-2014
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT OF
AN AD VALOREM TAX AND A SANITATION TAX

WHEREAS, in order to provide revenue for general governmental purposes and operation, with manner of assessment and collection of said taxes; and

WHEREAS, to provide the assessment of all real property within the City corporate limits as of January 1, 2013; and

WHEREAS, the provisions for the levy and collection of these taxes shall apply for a period starting on July 1, 2013 and ending June 30th, 2014.

NOW THEREFORE, the council of the City of St. Regis Park does ordain as follows:

Section 1:

The assessment of said real property shall be the valuation as listed on the Jefferson County Property Valuation tax records as of January 1st, 2013 and is hereby adopted as the assessment for ad valorem tax purposes.

Section 2:

To levy an ad valorem tax of all real property and property of utility companies as allowed by law at the rate of \$.138 cents per one hundred dollars of the assessed value.

Section 3:

To levy a special sanitation tax assessment under KRS 82.095 on every residence within the City at the rate of \$172.20 per household.

Section 4:

Said taxes shall be due and payable to the "City of St. Regis Park" and mailed to the City of St. Regis Park, C/O River City Bank, 2501 Bardstown Road, Louisville, KY 40205, as follows: July 15 through September 30th the discounted amount (5% discount off face amount). Face amount to October 31st. November 1 and thereafter, face amount of total bill, plus fifteen percent (15%) penalty, plus an additional one percent (1%) interest charge compounded per month starting November 1, 2013. November 1, 2013 the tax bill becomes delinquent and collection of said taxes shall be made in the manner prescribed by law. Failure to pay the tax and penalty shall and will constitute a lien upon the property in question.

Section 5:

The revenue from said taxes, interest and penalties shall be used for the general operating expenses of the City and for the general purposes for the City in the discharge of its municipal functions as ordained, resolved or directed by the City Council of St. Regis Park. Any surplus from said taxes shall go to the general operation fund of the City.

Section 6:

This ordinance shall be effective upon passage and publication.



CITY COUNCIL VACANCY

A vacancy now exists on the St. Regis Park City Council. St. Regis Park Ordinance No. 4, Series 2012-2013 "Regarding Vacancies on the City Council" states in part that any vacant position must be advertised.

A candidate for City Council must be a resident of the City (does not have to be a property owner) for not less than one year prior to his/her appointment, must be at least 21 years of age, must be a qualified voter in the City, and must reside in the City throughout his/her term of office. Candidates must submit their resumes by either e-mail to cityofstregispark@mcmahanfire.com or by first class mail to the following address:

The City Clerk **must** receive all resumes **no later than** Friday, June 28, 2013. The Council shall review the resumes to insure all requirements are met. Interviews will then be conducted on the date of the next regular City Council Meeting, July 2, 2013. After interviewing all qualified candidates, the City Council will make a recommendation to fill the vacancy. The position will be filled by a majority vote of Council Members.

PUBLIC SAFETY CORNER

PERSONAL SECURITY

- These guidelines are not all-inclusive and should not supplant other effective safety measures you may already be using.
- Use these guidelines to reduce your vulnerability.
- Trust your instincts that something may be wrong, and take appropriate action

SECURITY AT HOME

NEIGHBORS:

- Know your neighbors and learn who can be called for assistance. Keep a list of their phone numbers.
- Use only first initials and last names on mailboxes and in phone books.

KEYS – LOCKS:

- Change the locks when you move into a new residence.
- Don't hide spare keys outside. If you choose to do so, don't put them near the door. Make the hiding spot as obscure as possible, and don't tell anyone where it is.
- Always lock doors when doing yard work or otherwise spending time in the yard. Keep your keys with you at all times. If you have a portable or cell phone, take it with you.

VISITORS AND OTHERS:

- Check the identification of repair people, salespeople, utility workers, or others who come to the door. Don't hesitate to refuse entrance if something feels wrong or if they cannot provide proof of their identity.
- If you let someone in and have second thoughts, be assertive. Tell them to leave or leave yourself. Pretend you are not alone.

BE CAUTIOUS ABOUT ABSENCES:

- Instruct children and babysitters not to give out information about who is home, who is out, or how long they will be gone.
- Avoid advertising your absence. Don't leave notes on your door. Remove solicitors' material from your door or doorknob. During vacations, cancel your newspaper and mail, or have a relative or trusted neighbor pick them up.

RETURNING HOME:

- If you suspect your home has been broken into, **don't go in**. Go someplace else and **call 911**.

IN MEMORIAM JAMES B. WALSH

JAMES B. "JIM" WALSH, 69, passed away unexpectedly at his home on Tuesday morning, June 4, 2013. Jim was born in Louisville, was a U.S. Air Force veteran, and was a graduate of St. Xavier High School and Bellarmine College. He was a retired business owner, a member of the Church of the Ascension, and had served as a Councilman for the City of St. Regis Park for many years under numerous administrations.

Jim is survived by his wife, Nancy L. (Hubbs) Walsh; his children, Patrick Walsh (Andrea), Timothy Walsh (Stacy), and Sara Walsh Stevenson (Scott); his brother, Tony Walsh; his sisters, Mary Jane Bickett and Martha Wilder; and his grandchildren, Brooke, Rianna, Madelyn, and Brennan.

"On June 4th, the City of St. Regis Park unexpectedly lost Councilman Jim Walsh. Jim and his family have been members of our neighborhood since 1986. During many of these years Jim was affectionately known as the "Ice Cream Man" as he owned the Baskin Robbins ice cream store in Hikes Point.

After retiring and while I was serving as Mayor, a seat on the City Council opened in 2007. In need of a volunteer with a financial background, I asked Jim if he would be interested in helping me by serving on the City Council. Jim graciously accepted this role. Jim grew into his position over the years, and his leadership can be seen in the City's successful financial position. He was committed to the success of our City events and can be seen in many of our Christmas pictures wearing a

red suit, black boots, a white beard and a broad smile. Just like Santa, Jim enjoyed spreading joy each holiday season. In my conversations as Mayor and as a citizen, I could tell he truly enjoyed being a representative of our neighborhood.

As a Councilman, Jim was never the loudest voice in the room, but when Jim spoke or raised questions at meetings or in negotiations, everyone would listen. Because in his role as Councilman, Jim was known for speaking on behalf of "all" the citizens of St. Regis Park. City Council meetings are known for occasionally being emotionally charged as Council Members and citizens debate impassioned issues. But through Jim's leadership and calm demeanor, he could be counted on as a voice of reason and common sense.

Jim's leadership and passion for helping our City and neighborhood could also be seen in his volunteer roles at the McMahan Fire Department, especially with the WHAS Crusade for Children. One of the best compliments I've overheard over the last couple of days which really captured Jim's character went "you know, I've known Jim for many years and never heard him say a negative word about someone." I too know that to be true. Jim was a good friend, neighbor and Councilman.

So on behalf of the Mayors and Council Members fortunate enough to serve with him, I can say he will be truly missed, but his efforts and contributions to our City and community will always remain."

ORDINANCE OF THE MONTH

Chapter 35: Taxation

CITY OF ST. REGIS PARK ORDINANCE 35.01: COUNTY ASSESSMENT ADOPTED

- Pursuant to the authority granted in KRS 132.285, the City hereby adopts the Jefferson County assessment for all real and personal property situated within the City as the basis of all ad valorem tax levies ordered or approved by the City Council.
- The assessment as finally determined for county tax purposes shall serve as the basis for all City levies for the fiscal year commencing after the assessment date.

35.02 DUE DATE: PAYMENT

- (A) All taxes, except ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles, shall become due on November 1.
- (B) If tax is paid on or before October 1, the bill shall be subject to a discount of five percent (5%).

35.03 DELINQUENCY

- (A) All City taxes, except ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles, shall become delinquent on November 1 following their due dates
- (B) Any taxes not paid by the date when they become delinquent shall be subject to a penalty of 15% on the taxes due and unpaid, plus an additional 1% interest charge compounded per month starting November 1.


