MINUTES OF THE REGULAR
MONTHLY COUNCIL MEETING

Tuesday, April 1, 2014

Following are the Minutes of the regular monthly Council Meeting for the City of St. Regis Park, held at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, April 1, 2014, at 4318 Taylorsville Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40220.

ROLL CALL:

Present: Council Members Talbott Allen, Greg Dietz, Stephen Hoard, Louie Schweickhardt and Cheryl Willett.
Absent: Mayor Brandt Davis, Council Members Bob Graves and Frank Wheatley

MAYOR'S REPORT:

In Mayor Brandt Davis' absence, Mr. Greg Dietz made a motion to appoint Mr. Talbott Allen as Mayor Pro-tem. The motion was seconded by Mr. Louie Schweickhardt and passed without dissent.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Charlie Veeneman presented the Financial Report for March 2014. The General Fund revenues for the month were \$4,742.51, with year-to-date revenues of \$345,394.29. Total expenses for the month were \$16,884.86, with year-to-date expenses at \$236,610.98, resulting in excess revenue over expenses of \$108,783.31.

Total monthly revenues for the Road Fund were \$2,597.04, with year-to-date revenues at \$26,934.90. Total expenses for the month were \$10,050.00, with total year-to-date expenses at \$21,300.00, resulting in excess revenue of \$5,634.90. Complete financials are posted on the City's website at www.stregispark.net.

Ms. Cheryl Willett made a motion to accept the March 2014 Financial Report as presented. Mr. Schweickhardt seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

Mr. Dietz discussed investment options for the City and recommended 2013 property tax funds be placed in a money market account at this time. A motion was made by Mr. Dietz to move \$250,000 from the property tax account (non-interest bearing) to the money market account. Mr. Stephen Hoard seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING:

Mr. Hoard made a motion to approve the Minutes of the regular Council Meeting held March 4, 2014. Mr. Dietz seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

POLICE REPORT:

LMPD Officer Cliff Roberts, representing Kentuckiana Law Enforcement (KLE), was present and reviewed the March 2014 Small City Activity Sheet which will be published in the monthly newsletter.

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT: MEL MILBURN (Not Present)

CITATION OFFICER'S REPORT: DREW AMON

Mr. Amon reported 70 miles patrolled in March and 13 Hi-Neighbor notices issued. Mr. Hoard advised he had received some complaints on a residence on Riders Row Court. Mr. Amon will follow-up.

CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT: JOHN SINGLER

Mr. Singler presented a proposed financial management plan for the City. A first reading will be held at the May meeting.

The City also had a request from a resident to purchase property tax liens. Mr. Singler stated this would take a statutory process and would not be a financially prudent action for either party.

PUBLIC WORKS: LOUIE SCHWEICKHARDT

Mr. Schweickhardt introduced the following residents who have volunteered to be on the City of St. Regis Park Tree Board:

Mrs. Jane Ecker of Aintree Way was appointed to a one (1) year term, which will expire April 1, 2015.

Mrs. Mary Mattingly of Lincoln Road was appointed to a two (2) year term, which will expire April 1, 2016.

Mr. Joe Hinkle of Hurdle Way was appointed to a three (3) year term, which will expire April 1, 2017.

These appointments were made through individual motions made by Mr. Schweickhardt and seconded by Ms. Willett. Each motion passed without dissent. The newly appointed members will plan a meeting and present their minutes to the City Clerk.

Mr. Schweickhardt also wanted to thank Mr. Bill Holton of Dannywood Road for his donation of trees to the City. The Tree Board will review the next course of action for the donated trees.

The City has "No Parking" signs available for use by residents who host large gatherings. Residents may call City Clerk Bill Hodapp at 491-7777 for information regarding the use of these signs.

Mr. Allen reported the proposed Church of the Ascension’s 5K walk/run has been cancelled.



Dear Citizens:

Throughout Louisville, there is concern over the random nature of the March 22 teen violence that started on the Big Four Bridge — as well as the city's plan to ensure there is no recurrence.

There will be accountability for both those who committed a crime, as well as negligent parents and guardians. Concurrently, we are enhancing programs to develop the youth in our community. The starting point for all conversation on this matter is that violence of any form will not be tolerated.

The following are actions that are either in place or under consideration.

Increased public safety presence: We have significantly increased our police presence downtown and at Waterfront Park (on bikes, foot, horseback, and in patrol cars — including an around-the-clock presence at the Big Four Bridge). A highly visible new police substation will soon be located in or near the arena/Fourth Street Live district. We also will be using personnel from Louisville Fire, EMS and Corrections to be eyes on the street and notify the police of any suspicious activity. In addition, the Downtown Partnership has increased the times its ambassadors walk the streets, the Waterfront Development Corp has added security and TARC has enhanced security on specific bus routes. These systems will ensure that our city is safe every day, in addition to being prepared for the city's many events and festivals.

Early warning systems: Twenty-six (26) cameras that will be monitored in real time will be installed at Waterfront Park, including the Big Four Bridge, before Thunder Over Louisville on April 12. A review of the need for other cameras downtown is underway. LMPD and the Downtown Partnership are examining the possibility of accessing private cameras at local businesses that are focused on public spaces. Existing public cameras are part of the overall system.

We have increased our social media monitoring capability since that is one method used to organize large gatherings. And since some of those involved with the recent violence used public transit to move about the city, LMPD has enhanced communications with TARC to be made aware of unusual activity.

We also ask all 750,000 citizens to be part of our early warning system. If you see something unusual, say something by contacting police at 574-LMPD or calling 911.

Accountability: Arrests have been made, more are expected, and the investigation is ongoing. Those who have committed crimes will be held accountable through the adult and juvenile justice systems. Where appropriate, restorative justice approaches may be offered to assist non-violent youth in accepting responsibility for their actions and identifying ways to make amends to the victim(s) and the community. We recognize the central role that parents and families play in preventing delinquency and supervising their children. We are exploring methods to hold parents/guardians accountable through legal avenues and are seeking creative ways to enhance parental involvement and responsibility. We will evaluate other measures that may be effective, including enhancements to the city's curfew law.

Youth development: We can all agree that youth and young adults who commit serious and violent acts should be removed from the streets, however there is not a "one size fits all" approach to juvenile delinquency. In fact, research indicates that locking up nonviolent youth for long periods may only turn them into future adult criminals. We do know that investing in our youth leads to more resilient and productive adults.

The city's Safe and Healthy Neighborhoods initiative, which was created following the May 2012 triple homicide in the Parkland neighborhood, has been working directly on the street, with mentors, churches and young adults to reduce crime. Last summer, for example, the initiative partnered with police to host the Gentlemen's Academy, an intensive six-week overnight program for 40 male at-risk teens between the ages of 12 and 17. The program delivers some tough love and exposes these young men to what is possible in their lives. (Read the Safe and Healthy Neighborhoods plan at <http://louisvilleky.gov/safeneighborhoods>)

Our city is also among the charter members of Cities United, a new national partnership to eliminate violent deaths of African-American males aged 15-24. This partnership allows us to benchmark national best practices with violence reduction.

In addition, we are working on other efforts to develop teens:

- **Summer Jobs.** SummerWorks started in 2011, the first year of my administration, and has grown from initially employing 200 teens to this summer's goal of 2,000. Giving a teen a job — and the experience that comes with it — can change a young person's life. Be part of the solution by hiring a teen or by donating \$2,000 to sponsor a youth's employment at a local non-profit. Call 502-574-3069 to get involved.
- **Out of School Time.** Working with the Out of School Time Coordinating Council -- a partnership between Metro United Way, Louisville Metro Government and Jefferson County Public Schools--we offer many excellent programs. I encourage all parents to get

your kids involved (for a list of programs by zip code and neighborhood, visit <http://services.louisvilleky.gov/youthservicesdirectory/programsearch.aspx>).

- **Community Centers.** Our centers will extend their hours this summer. Details will be released before school dismisses in June. We are looking for volunteers to help with staffing -- call (502) 456-8178 to help.
- **Mentoring.** Research shows that pairing an adult mentor with an at-risk student makes a real impact. The city is in immediate need of 200 mentors for a program called Right Turn, which targets youth ages 16-19. It requires a firm commitment of at least one hour per week for one full year and our team will provide the training to ensure that the mentorship is successful. To become part of this important initiative, contact Anthony Smith (anthony.smith2@louisvilleky.gov).

In addition to these efforts, we need the community to help -- especially parents and guardians. Family members need to know where their children are, who they are with, what they are doing, and when they will be home.

I will communicate the financial details associated with the programs above during my May 22 speech to the Metro Council, which will address the new fiscal year budget that starts July 1. In the meantime, adjustments will be made to pay for these initiatives for the balance of this fiscal year.

Public safety is my top responsibility. The data shows Louisville is a safe city. The FBI's most recent comprehensive national crime report, from 2012, shows that of the 18 cities with a population between 500,000 and 800,000, Louisville ranks as the 5th safest city. In addition, due to the good work of LMPD and many community partners, crime in Louisville has decreased two years in a row.

That being said, the random violence of March 22 merits a forceful response, blending both strength and compassion. My administration will continue to work with great vigor to ensure the health, vibrancy and safety of our city.

PUBLIC SAFETY CORNER

VERY, VERY IMPORTANT

On Saturday, March 22, teen mob violence spawned at least 17 assaults and robberies in downtown Louisville. Six people were hospitalized. On March 18, a horde of teens attempted to storm a bus at 34th and Broadway. Two days earlier a teen was stabbed in the heart during a scuffle on a bus. He later died. Louisville officials described these as isolated incidents. In fact, Mayor Greg Fischer said “We will try to reach out to the kids who are lost and encourage them not to fall into this group thing.” What took place should not be minimized. It seems these were not “one-time events.”

There is a difference between teens looking for something to do and criminal behavior. In fact, such activities have reportedly been occurring for the past six months. Until these latest events, officials have seemingly kept knowledge of these acts “under wraps.”

With Derby festivities quickly approaching, all citizens are encouraged to exercise extreme caution when attending any and all events. Always be aware of your surroundings. Avoid questionable areas. Your safety and that of your family is of the utmost importance.

SPRING SAFETY TIPS

With somewhat warmer weather and longer days approaching, residents are focusing on long neglected projects like spring cleaning, home repairs and yard work. Homeowners are ready to clean up items that have accumulated over the winter.

Reduce the amount of clutter inside and outside your home. While clutter does not start fires, it can become fuel for a fire. Household and pool chemicals, paints and poisons should be marked and stored out of children’s reach. Dispose of any that are leaking or expired. Make sure gasoline and cleaning fluids are also marked and stored in a cool dry place away from the house and away from children and pets. Use only approved containers for gasoline storage. Common household chemicals can fuel a fire and can also be hazardous to your health. Maintain only the amounts you need and be sure to use, store and dispose of household hazardous materials in a safe manner as outlined on the product.

Your medicine cabinet is not meant to be a storage area for all of the medicines your child has ever been prescribed. Spring cleaning is a good time to get rid of them and any expired over-the-counter medicines you may have.



Maintain your yard – trim bushes, plants and trees. Removing vegetation clears fuel for any potential fire. Keep gutters and roofs clear of leaves and other buildup. Check the kids’ play area for sharp objects, poisonous plants, and tripping hazards.

Clean up work areas by putting tools and other work items away from children’s reach. Remove all fire hazards, including stacks of rags, newspapers and magazines. Pay attention to spaces around your hot water tanks, fireplaces, space heaters and dryers as well as under stairs.

Check your barbecue grill for leaks and cracks and be sure to store any propane tanks at least 10 feet away from your house and garage. Locate grills a safe distance, also at least 10 feet, from buildings or wooden decks.

Test all your smoke alarms to insure they are working. Change the batteries at least once every year. Most smoke alarms also need “spring cleaning” maintenance – check your manual.

Spring cleaning can improve the safety of your home and your family!



INFORMATION TO IMPROVE HOMEOWNERSHIP

STAR SPANGLED BANNER



Our American flag is obviously the symbol of our country but it has come to remind us of every man and woman who has fought for the freedom that we enjoy. The emotions that are stirred by images of our flag can run from happiness to sadness to even anger and everything in between.

Most of us learned basic flag etiquette when we were young but occasionally, it is a good idea to review the procedures so that we can treat the flag with the respect that it deserves.

- * The U.S. flag should not be flown at night unless a light is shown on it.
- * The U.S. flag should never touch the ground.
- * The U.S. flag should not be flown upside down except as a distress signal.
- * A U.S. flag should be displayed at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half-staff.
- * When displaying multiple flags of a state, community or society on the same flagpole, the U.S. flag must always be on top.
- * When flown with flags of states, communities or societies on separate flag poles which are of the same height and in a straight line, the flag of the United States is always placed in the position of honor – to its own right. No flag should be higher or larger than the U.S. flag. The U.S. flag is always the first flag raised and the last to be lowered.
- * When the U.S. flag is flown with those of other countries, each flag should be the same size and must be on separate poles of the same height. Ideally, the flags should be raised and lowered simultaneously.
