MINUTES OF THE REGULAR
MONTHLY COUNCIL MEETING

Tuesday, October 1, 2013

Following are the Minutes of the monthly Council Meeting for the City of St. Regis Park, held at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, October 1, 2013, at 4318 Taylorsville Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40220.

ROLL CALL:

Present: Allen, Davis, Dietz, Graves, Hoard, Schweickhardt, Wheatley, Willett.

Absent: None

MAYOR'S REPORT AND CITIZEN PARTICIPATION:

Mayor Brandt Davis called the meeting to order and introduced Ms. Carolyn Westfall, who is a certified arborist for Greenhaven Tree Care and a Druid Hills Councilperson. Ms. Westfall discussed how Druid Hills and other smaller cities have developed tree programs for their communities and what steps can be taken to assist residents. Ms. Westfall recommended that the Council decide on what approach the City wishes to take and then develop a tree ordinance to manage the process. The Council will work to develop an advisory committee of residents who wish to assist with the tree program. Any resident interested in participating should contact Councilman Louie Sckweickhardt.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Charlie Veeneman, the City's accountant, presented the Financial Report for September 2013. Total Revenues for the month were \$152,120.73, and the General Fund's total revenues for the year-to-date were \$243,831.37. Total Expenses for the month were \$26,262.35. The General Fund's total expenses for the year-to-date were \$73,779.70 resulting in excess revenue over expenses of \$170,051.67.

Revenues for the Road Fund were \$3,060.99 as of September 30, 2013 with no incurred expenses during the month. The Road Fund balance was \$9,284.34 as of September 30, 2013. Complete financial reports are posted on the City's website at www.stregispark.net

Mr. Talbott Allen made a motion to accept the September 2013 Financial Report as presented. Ms. Cheryl Willett seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING:

Mr. Stephen Hoard made a motion to approve the Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting held September 3, 2013.

Mr. Greg Dietz seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

POLICE REPORT:

LMPD Officer Kenneth Betts, representing Kentuckiana Law Enforcement (KLE), was present. Officer Betts presented the September 2013 Small City Activity Report to be published in the monthly newsletter.

Mr. Bob Feger who resides on Lincoln Road inquired about an address on Lincoln that was on the activity sheet. Officer Betts believes the address was entered incorrectly and will make the change on future activity sheets.

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT: MEL MILBURN

Mr. Mel Milburn reviewed the following projects:

Flynn Brothers has completed the road sealing, and Mr. Milburn requested to review and approve the invoice before payment is made.

The concrete grinding and sidewalk replacement project is complete, and full payment has been approved.

A contractor has been selected to repair the ditch line in the field located on the Bullitt property at the end of Lincoln Road. The contractor will replace the small gravel with larger rock in an effort to eliminate the migration of the rock into a neighbor's yard. The estimated cost of the project is \$1,800.00. The Bullitt Trust has agreed to share the cost with the City.

CITATION OFFICER'S REPORT: DREW AMON

Mr. Amon reported 84 miles were patrolled during the month of September 2013. Mr. Amon issued six (6) Hi Neighbor notices and nine (9) Notices of Violation (NOV).

CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT: JOHN SINGLER

Mr. Singler contacted the Bullitt property owner representative regarding the ditch line project at the field at the end of Lincoln Road. They have agreed to share the cost of the repairs outlined above.

Mr. Singler reported on the foreclosures of several properties within the City and will continue to track the progress of the foreclosures. The City has been contracting to have the lawn cut on several of these properties, and liens will be filed accordingly.

Mr. Singler introduced the First Reading of Ordinance No. 4, Series 2013-2014. This proposed ordinance would

Approve the Extension of the Franchise Agreement for Community Antenna Television (CATV) Services of Insight KY Partners II L.P. A motion to approve the First Reading of the referenced ordinance as presented was made by Mr. Schweickhardt. The motion was seconded by Mr. Allen. The motion passed without dissent.

COUNCIL MEMBERS' REPORTS

PUBLIC WORKS – LOUIE SCHWEICKHARDT

The street sign replacement project is 30%-40% complete. Mr. Schweickhardt will make arrangements to have the backside of the speed hump signs on Woodmont painted black so they are uniform with the new signage.

Mr. Bill Holton of Dannywood Road had contacted Mr. Schweickhardt about a fence demolition and the required disposal requirements. The project has been completed, and no further action is required.

Mayor Davis asked if the Council should get other recommendations from another tree company on the tree program. The Council deferred further tree program discussion until the November 5, 2013 meeting.

SPECIAL EVENTS – TALBOTT ALLEN

Light Up St. Regis will take place on Saturday, December 14, 2013. Mr. Allen will have a meeting with his committee within the next week to discuss the specifics. A flyer will be developed and posted on the City's website, Facebook and printed in the upcoming newsletters. Mr. Allen is also in need of volunteers to assist with the celebration. Anyone interested should contact Mr. Allen at 451-3776.

The Ascension Youth Group has agreed to fill the sand bags and assemble the luminary supplies for Light Up St. Regis. A monetary donation will be made to the Youth Group upon completion of the project.

Mr. Feger, Chairman of the Ascension Summer Festival, informed the Council that a 5K run is being proposed for the 2014 festival. He will keep the Council informed of the proposed routes, date and time of the event in May of 2014.

Mr. Allen and Mr. Dietz are working on a new neighbor welcome packet.

PUBLIC SAFETY – CHERYL WILLET

Ms. Willett reviewed the monthly police report. Ms. Willett also stated that no residents were in favor of installing new street lights.

BUILDING PERMITS – STEPHEN HOARD

Mr. Hoard reported a building permit was issued for a new

fence in the 4300 block of Statton Road.

Mr. Hoard also requested information regarding the parking of a recreational vehicle (RV) on a corner lot. Mr. Singler explained that the language in the current ordinance requires an RV be parked ten feet behind the house on a paved surface.

Mr. Amon was asked to check on the installation of a new fence on Riders Row Court.

Mr. Graves continues to add more information in the newsletter and has received several compliments on the content.

Traffic Safety Tips

SPEEDING:

- Speeding triples the odds of being involved in a collision.
- Speeding is a leading factor in fatal crashes – nearly 1/3 of fatal collisions involved speed as a factor.
- The other top two factors for collisions are drowsiness and driver inattention.
- Car crashes are the number one cause of deaths for youths 15-24 years of age.
- The probability of death, disfigurement or debilitating injury increase with higher speed at impact. The consequences double for every 10 miles per hour that a vehicle travels.

SEAT BELTS:

- In 2006, 2/3 of those who were killed in vehicle collisions in Kentucky were not wearing seat belts.
- When properly used, lap/shoulder belts can reduce the risk of fatal injury to front seat passengers by 45% -- and risk of moderate to critical injury by 50%.
- Kentucky has the third lowest rate of seat belt usage in the country.
- Nationally, 83% of people report using safety belts – in Kentucky that number is 67%.
- Last year, Kentucky enacted a Primary Seat Belt Law – meaning drivers may be stopped solely for driving without using their seat belt.

ALCOHOL:

- 75% of fatal crashes involving alcohol included a driver with a Blood Alcohol Content of 0.10 or 0.11 – the legal limit is 0.08.
- More than half of those drivers (52%) had double the legal limit (0.16).
- One third of those arrested or convicted of DUI are repeat offenders.
- The Jefferson County Attorney's Office has a 96% conviction rate against DUI offenders.

MOTORCYCLISTS:

- Motorcyclists involved in fatal crashes have an even higher incidence of speed and alcohol as factors in those events than other motor vehicles.
- 25% of motorcycle operators involved in fatal crashes had invalid operator licenses – compared with 12% of passenger vehicles.
- The use of helmets would have reduced the number of fatal motorcycle crashes by 37%.

ORDINANCE OF THE MONTH

ORDINANCE 830.1, SERIES 1991

(passed January 8, 1991)

GARBAGE

50.01 PLACEMENT; COLLECTION AND REMOVAL.

- (A) No garbage, grass or trash shall be placed at the curb side before 3:00 p.m., the day prior to pickup.
- (B) All garbage cans and items not collected shall be removed from the curb side by 7:00 p.m., the day of pickup.
- (C) During the fall of the year, leaves may be placed in appropriate containers at the curb side prior to pickup after 3:00 p.m.
- (D) The placement of garbage, grass, leaves or trash at the curb side shall be at least five feet from the property line.

CRIME PREVENTION

Some crimes are preventable. You can do your part to prevent crimes by following a few key points.

- Secure all valuables before you leave your vehicle (GPS, laptops, purses, cell phones, briefcases, backpacks, etc.), and don't forget to lock your car doors.
- When you make a new purchase (televisions, game systems, stereo equipment, etc.), record the model and serial numbers along with the value of these items at the time of purchase. Keep this information in a secure location.
- Photograph your valuables (jewelry, electronics, coin collections, etc.) This could prove invaluable in recovering your property if stolen
- When planning to be away from home, stop your paper and mail delivery or have a neighbor or relative pick them up daily. Notify Kentuckiana Law Enforcement (KLE) to put you on the Housewatch List (jaubrey@kleonline.net).
- Sometimes criminals review the obituaries and plan burglaries around times you may be away attending the funeral of a loved one. Always make plans to have someone watch your home when you are away.
- Never leave your doors or windows unlocked when you leave home. Thieves could be watching!

INFORMATION TO IMPROVE HOMEOWNERSHIP

HOMEOWNER INSURANCE RATINGS FOR YOUR BEST FRIEND

Man's best friend enjoys many of the benefits of his master's home besides food and shelter and a comfortable place to live and play. In return, dog owners expect companionship and possibly, protection; after all, even a small dog can bark to signal intruders.

Few people doubt that most dog owners love their pets and treat them well. The costs associated with having a dog can include medical and dental that rivals human expenses, premium food, toys, grooming and license fees. However, one of the expenses not anticipated by pet owners is a higher homeowner's insurance premium.

There are almost five million dog bites a year with children being the main victims.

"Dog bites accounted for more than one-third of all homeowner's insurance liability claim dollars paid out in 2012, which amounted to more than \$489 million," said Peter Robertson, representing the Property Casualty Insurers Association of America, testifying against the bill at a hearing of the Committee on Financial Services. He said, "The total cost of dog bite claims increased by more than 51% between 2003 and 2012." It is now estimated that dog bites cause losses of over one billion dollars a year.

Some insurance underwriters have denied or canceled coverage or increased the premium of the owner's liability insurance based on the homeowner's specific breed of dog such as Pit Bulls, Dobermans, Akitas, Mastiffs and even German Shepherds. The aggressive nature of certain types of dogs combined with specific training or lack of training, abuse or neglect are identified by insurers' refusal to provide liability coverage.

If you are considering what insurers identify as a high-risk pet, you might want to visit your insurance agent prior to acquiring your new best friend to see if it affects your rates.
